Introduction

The Tank Theatre Project was funded by Ernest Cook Trust, with subsequent support from The Avon and Somerset Constabulary Trust, to establish an inner-city theatre company for young people of Bristol aged 15-26.

The company worked to update and modernise Shakespeare's Macbeth teaching young people about scriptwriting and performance theory, to help them develop an appreciation of the classical work. The group took part in a series of acting workshops, leading up to a final full-scale, professional production at the Trinity Centre, entitled *M.C.Beth*.

Target group

The project targeted young people classed as 'hard to reach', predominantly from black and minority ethnic communities. Outreach was focused in the wards of Easton, Ashley. The aim for the project was to engage young actors from inner-city communities who may otherwise not engage with mainstream provision and theatre in order to improve representation and participation in these areas.

Key aims

- to deliver a series of acting and theatre sessions around Shakespeare to change the young people's perceptions that 'it's not for us' and increase understanding and appreciation of classical texts
- to raise the self-esteem, confidence and skills base of young participants
- to build links with other Bristol performance venues including Bristol Old Vic, Tobacco Factory, Bristol Brewery, Alma Tavern and Colston Hall
- to ensure the ongoing engagement and participation in theatre of the young participants and encourage them to attend and learn from other productions
- to attract new audiences to theatre





- to offer a creative and inspiring learning environment for young people and provide a
 positive working relationship with adults and project leaders, to improve young people's
 perceptions of authority figures.
- (specifically through the partnership with the A&S Constabulary) to aid restorative justice in communities and improve relationships between young people and law enforcement agencies.

Outcomes and achievements

We engaged with 19 individuals in the project aged between 17-26. 13 of the cast took part in the final performance, and performed in from of an audience totalling 287 across a three-night show-run.

When asked on arrival, 69% of the audience who attended had not been to a theatre performance before.

90% of the cast had never performed Shakespeare before, yet the difficult words of the bard were spoke with authority and intent.

The cast have all said in their feedback how this has made them feel like they can become major successes in the theatre world .

50% of the cast have never been to the theatre before now they all want to go (and this is something that we have incorporated as an activity at the end of the project).

Representatives from The Police, The Colston Hall and The Tobacco factory attended the performance and all fed back positively.





What worked

- The combination of Shakespeare's words and local street dialect worked well.
- The young cast now feel like they are part of a family that can support and nurture each other onto greater things.
- The performances were incredibly well received and attended.
- The feedback from industry professionals has been outstanding and all recorded audience feedback was brilliant.
- The project leaders were given respect, authority and well liked by the cast, which helped in order for them to feel a sense of achievement and ownership of the project.

Who benefited

All of the partners, individuals, professionals, performers and actors who took part in the project:

- Trinity benefited by having a truly representative audience from the community.
- The young actors benefited immensely from interactions with professionals and each other.
- The project leaders benefitted by working with such passionate young individuals and by getting to showcase their skills.

Learning

- We found it hard to find young actors for the project at first.
- Communication issues and clear understanding of roles.
- Time-scales and external commitments meant the co-writing experience was not as beneficial as it could have been
- We wanted to do arts awards for the young actors but due to cuts in the budget, we were unable to do this.
- Should have bought a producer earlier.

Conclusion and next steps

From the feedback from the young actors, parents, Police and audience we have identified a clear need for this project to continue.

We are evaluating our options and focusing on the next phase of the project. We would like to run an extended programme, have more opportunities for young people to engage with and experience other theatrical performances and genres and develop opportunities for young people to take their performances to other theatrical venues in the city.

Our aim is to develop a wider project programme of activities and seek funding through agencies such as the Arts Council Grants for the Arts in order to enhance the scope and reach of the project.
